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Making the first move

Nothing ever stays the same. The current bulk wine and grape markets are no exception and staying current on supply and demand dynamics are as important now than ever. Buyers and sellers of grapes have generally finished their early sourcing, are looking at cluster count information, and waiting on set for the next bit of information on crop size. They continue to look at case sales information and inventories to add to the formula of how much more to purchase or sell and when to do so.

Bulk buyers and sellers are waiting for each other to make the first move. Bulk buyers are saying things like, "When the price drops to \$X.XX, I will buy." Meanwhile, some sellers are holding to last year's prices and for the time-being, seem willing to sit on their inventory rather than selling their bulk wine at today's lower market prices. Waiting to make the first move and employing the "Other Guy" strategy may not be the best strategy to stay ahead of the competition. Sometimes, leading the market can be very beneficial and can put a company ahead of the curve. The earlier to the market as a buyer or seller, the more options there are whether it's wine quality needed today or the opportunity to store the wine and bottle it later. A number of buyers and sellers are currently employing this "Other Guy" strategy. For colorful details on the "Other Guy" strategy, Bill Turrentine wrote a great article back in December of 2010.

Following are some brief points about the current market for bulk wine and an update on the grape season to date. As you know, the most effective way to get the complete picture is to call your friendly Turrentine bulk broker or grape broker to talk over your unique market position.


Bulk Wine Market

2017 white blends and 2016 red blends are being finalized with new lots becoming available every day. Additionally, there are fewer older vintage wines in the market leaving us with a more diverse selection of 'fresh' wines from all areas in California. In the next few weeks, there may be new opportunities for wines that can be sourced and bottled before harvest. Buyers are still predominantly not looking to be opportunistic on volume and instead are sourcing via a just-in-time inventory strategy for the right quality wines to improve or finish a blend.

As we stretch into summer, there are many moving parts for wineries before harvest: tanker trucks get busy, storage tanks are getting committed, and bottling line schedules are filling up. Service providers may have a tougher time adding new projects to the calendar, so the earlier plans are made—the greater the flexibility and options.

Opportunity Knocks

It is no real surprise that Cabernet Sauvignon from all California regions and Washington falls into the 'opportunity knocks' category since more acres of Cabernet Sauvignon have been planted than any other variety in recent years. Turrentine has more gallons available of Cabernet Sauvignon than any other variety currently trading on the spot market. We not only have more volume actively for sale, but more diversity of lots listed for sale. In the interior, we have 1.17 million gallons trading in the price range of \$5.00 to \$9.00 in the last 60 days. It is important to note we have begun to see prices trend downward in the last month. In Napa, we have over 360,000 gallons of Cabernet Sauvignon available. In Lake and Mendocino, we have over 500,000 gallons, most of which is 2017 vintage. In other areas such as Paso Robles, there continues to be increases in volume of Cabernet Sauvignon available for sale and there has been decent demand for the higher quality 2016 wines. Sales have been at lower prices than earlier in the year and lower than last year at this time.



Due to the increased interest in Rosé, production picked up again in 2017 and we have great options for last-minute Rosé blends of various styles made from different varieties and regions at attractive prices.

Pinot Noir from Sonoma County and the northern interior in this 'opportunity knocks' category might pique the interest of some clients and surprise others. We have more lots and more volume of Pinot Noir from these regions available as well as in the Central Coast where we have seen little demand since the New Year. Since it is challenging to find grapes, it might also surprise some that there are opportunities for Chardonnay in bulk from the Central Coast regions and Mendocino County, with some options to extend your 2017 blend or to be opportunistic on volume if the grapes needed cannot be sourced. We have 80 different Central Coast Chardonnay opportunities totaling just over 900,000 gallons. Some sellers may be forced to move their wines before harvest due to capacity constraints and also the lack of demand that can follow previous vintage Chardonnay through harvest.

Don't Over-estimate the Opportunity

Volume actively for sale in bulk is down from last year for Chardonnay from Sonoma County and the San Joaquin Valley, but we are listing a greater diversity of lots to fulfill needs, improve quality, or moderate price. The bulk and grape markets for Sauvignon Blanc remain tight, and the perception of buyers is that none is available. We still have some lots of Central Coast, North Coast, Napa Valley, Sonoma County, and California Appellation Sauvignon Blanc at competitive prices. The market is winding down for the season, so don't wait!

Grape Market

All North Coast

- Bunch counts are all over the board in the North Coast depending on AVA and variety.
 From block to block on the same ranch, we are seeing and hearing different reports on bunch counts being anywhere from average to potentially above average at this point in time. Pinot Noir and Cabernet Sauvignon have the best chance of a solid crop based on cluster counts.
- Both wineries and growers in the North Coast are hoping for a uniform and quick bloom
 to set the crop. Over the last couple of years, we have seen an extended bloom which
 can lead to varied crop size and ripening at harvest. Bud push in the North Coast has
 been uniform in 2018, but bloom for the earlier varieties has been prolonged due to
 cooler than average temperatures.
- Bloom started in Alexander Valley Chardonnay as of May 7th which is a little later than
 the last couple years. Most wineries and growers feel bloom timing is a week to two
 weeks later than last year.
- Supply for sale in the North Coast (Napa, Sonoma, Lake, Mendocino, and Suisun)
 continues to be tight for major varietals (Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, and Pinot
 Noir) as most of the supply has been under longer-term contracts and not making its
 way to the spot market. If you are looking to source the major varieties, it is important to
 be in contact with us. As opportunities arise, we can make you aware of them.
- There are opportunities for buyers looking for quality Zinfandel and Merlot in Lake and Mendocino Counties. Sonoma County has supply for Zinfandel and there are longerterm supply opportunities as well.
- If mother nature sets a good crop and we have a moderate summer, we could see supply showing up for any and all varieties so stay in touch with us to make sure you do not miss out on any opportunities as they make their way to the market.

Central Coast

- Overall, the crop in San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara Counties looks solid.
- Early varieties look to be average to slightly below; a lot is riding on bloom and set.
- Later varieties such as Cabernet Sauvignon have potential to be above average if the crop sets.

- April and May frost did diminish the crop in some areas such as Santa Maria, Creston, and Shandon; secondaries have pushed in most cases and appear to be relatively fruitful.
- The grape market is active for very targeted grape buyer needs; we have yet to see any large volume activity to occur.

Monterey County/San Benito County

- Cool weather has made for a long bloom period. There are some stuck caps out there, causing concern with uniform development.
- Bunch counts look the same as last year. Younger vineyards are showing good yields at this point with significant variability in older vineyards.
- Supply is tight as most of the grapes are contracted; however, there are small quantities
 of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay still available.

Lodi/Delta

- The crop is setting and the vines are happy with the cooler temperatures than a year ago at this time.
- There is evidence of scattered frost damage but nothing has impacted potential yields.
- Older vineyards, 15+ years, are average(ish) to below-average for Chardonnay and Cabernet Sauvignon. In contrast, younger vineyards have high bunch counts with good elongation.
- There is a limited amount of supply available of Clarksburg Pinot Noir, Lodi Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Petite Sirah.

Southern San Joaquin

- The crop appears the same as last year except in isolated pockets that got hit with frost damage.
- The only really big crop could be Muscat of Alexandria, again.
- There is a different dynamic this year as buyers are interested in generic whites, like
 French Colombard and certain generic reds, like Grenache.
