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Market Opportunities

Perfect Storm

We are nearing a wrap to harvest for one of the most difficult years for the wine industry since Prohibition. Grape and bulk wine buying activity at the end of the season continues to be generally low statewide, with only a few opportunistic plays in the North Coast and Paso Robles and very little activity to replace grapes unfortunately rejected in any region.

The 2025 vintage was a perfect storm that came to a head at harvest. Among the multitude of challenges this year were a cooler growing season, low vineyard inputs due to diminished prices, minimal grape demand leading to uncontracted fruit, and multiple rain events during harvest which increased disease pressure on grapes already struggling to reach minimum Brix. Statewide, there are still many tons on the vine with multiple rain events in the latter half of October essentially ending harvest for many growers. Despite these challenges, there are numerous reports of very good quality wines.

Projecting total tons crushed in 2025 will be particularly difficult due to the lack of accurate information on acres removed, unfarmed acres, and the number of acres unharvested. What is clear, however, is that wineries have planned to go light on the 2025 vintage due to conservative sales forecasting and financial limitations amid sliding consumer sales trends. It is also clear that the incredible challenges this year will result

in what is likely to be the lightest crop on record since the mid-1990s and will be impactful in the future market transition from excess to balance.

Thinking Strategically

Many wineries have adopted a strategy to minimize their supply to reduce costs and risk, assuming they can source their needed supply later whether that is current bulk wine or additional grapes in 2026 and beyond. If this is your strategy, you are not alone. Just know that as you start coming back to the market, others will likely come at the same time, and the supply to choose from will be significantly less robust than in recent years. The best way to be successful is to stay informed by being in consistent contact with us.

The 2024 crush yielded just 2.87 million tons, the first time in over 20 years that the crush was below 3 million tons. Furthermore, projections for the 2025 crop are trending lower, with some industry estimates suggesting that tons crushed could fall as low as 2.1 million tons.

To further expand upon future supply from a bulk market perspective, the large 2023 harvest led to a significant amount of over-production and custom crushing, which resulted in a staggering peak of 17.9 million gallons of 2023 wine actively for sale on the bulk market. In contrast, the smaller 2024 crop saw a peak of 12.6 million gallons. This year, with a potential 30-year low tons crushed and fewer growers opting for custom crushing due to existing bulk wine inventory and mounting costs, significantly fewer gallons of the current vintage are expected to be available on the market.

Based on the average percentage of the crop typically represented on the bulk market at its peak, we project that only 5 to 9 million gallons of 2025 vintage wine will be listed at the peak next year, assuming a crop size between 2.1 and 2.8 million tons. Wineries that are relying on a "just-in-time" inventory approach may find fewer options available than they expect, especially if others are coming back to the market at the same time with similar quality level, variety, and appellation needs.


While we have yet to see any indication of changing markets, it is important to note that when the market changes, it can happen rapidly. This is particularly true when those in the market are adopting the same strategy. Our experience is that most buyers end up wanting the same grapes or bulk wine. Success in using this strategy will come from being more proactive and informed than your neighbors allowing you to capitalize on quality lots early. Bulk Market

Bulk gallons actively for sale are declining rapidly as the industry works through harvest. There are now fewer gallons listed than at any point since 2023 following the relatively small 2022 crop.

It is still early, and while there have been a few early listings of 2025 wines, we have yet to see these listings push supply back up. Even as 2025 vintage wines are coming to the market, we still have over 7 million gallons of 2023 and




nearly 2 million gallons of 2022 and older wines still on the market—significant volumes for this time of the year. There still may be a home for some select lots of 2023 vintage reds, but buyers do not seem interested in most of these wines.

Cabernet Sauvignon

There are currently 1 million gallons of Napa Valley Cabernet Sauvignon actively for sale on the bulk market, 650,000 gallons of which are 2024 vintage.

Demand has slowed during harvest, which is not out of the ordinary for any variety and region. Recent sales have been for 2023 vintage between below \$15.00 per gallon for truckload quantities and below \$20.00 per gallon for smaller lots.

Figure 2 - Cabernet Sauvignon Bulk Gallons Available





- Sonoma County Cabernet Sauvignon continues to be slow for the 850,000 gallons actively for sale. The available supply is split relatively evenly between 2023 and 2024 vintages. Buyers continue to mostly be focused on 2023 vintage lots, although demand is low, with recent sales between \$5.00 to \$13.00 per gallon.
- North Coast Cabernet Sauvignon actively for sale remains elevated at 2.2 million gallons on the market, though
 volume has come down significantly in recent weeks. Demand continues to be very limited with buyers not looking
 for specific AVAs and only looking for supply at the California Appellation price point.
- Central Coast Cabernet Sauvignon actively for sale is currently at 1.5 million gallons with most of the supply
 consisting of 2024 vintage lots. The limited demand in the market has been centered around Paso Robles for some
 time, with recent sales between \$6.00 to \$10.00 per gallon.
- California Appellation supply has come down a bit in recent months but remains high with 1.3 million of the 2.0 million gallons actively for sale being 2023 vintage or older. Recent sales have reflected the low demand ranging from below \$1.00 per gallon to \$5.00 per gallon for smaller volume deals.

Chardonnay

Supply of Chardonnay
continues to be in line with
historical averages with just 1.2
million gallons actively for sale
statewide. Demand will shift to
the 2025 vintage soon making it
difficult to move the remaining
2024 lots. "Just-in-time"
sourcing may offset some of the
shift to 2025, but it is likely to
consist of smaller volume deals.

of Sonoma County Chardonnay with volumes trending downward slowly. Demand has been limited but there have been some recent sales for Russian River Valley, Sonoma Coast, and Carneros Chardonnay between \$6.00 to \$12.00 per gallon.

- North Coast and Central Coast Chardonnay volume is also quite low with just 190,000 and 215,000 gallons actively
 for sale, respectively, but that hasn't stimulated additional demand. Buyers have not shown interest, and it would
 likely take a California Appellation price sub-\$4.00 per gallon to generate any interest.
- California Appellation Chardonnay gallons actively for sale have also come down dramatically throughout the year.

 There are now 545,000 gallons available, and 175,000 are 2023 vintage and unlikely to gain any interest from buyers.

Sauvignon Blanc

Early listings of 2025 Sauvignon Blanc are now available. While supplies are currently limited, we expect more to
come to the market very soon. If you are interested in 2025 Sauvignon Blanc, please reach out to us early to make
sure you have the best options to taste from.

Pinot Grigio

California Appellation Pinot
Grigio grapes were one of the
more difficult for buyers to find
this year. 2025 Pinot Grigio
in bulk has yet to really come
to the market and we expect
supplies to be limited. If you
are interested in purchasing
2025 bulk Pinot Grigio, please
let us know early.

Pinot Noir

- Volumes of Sonoma County
 Pinot Noir actively for sale have
 remained relatively stagnant
 over the last several months
 around 450,000 gallons. Buyers
 haven't shown actionable
 interest in available supply,
 but there have been some
 discussions around Russian
 River Valley lots.
- There are 280,000 gallons of North Coast and 860,000 gallons of Central Coast Pinot Noir actively for sale with larger quantities of 2023 and older vintage available, particularly in the Central Coast. There has been some limited activity for both regions between \$2.00 to \$7.00 per gallon. Most recent interest is for 2024, and it is

Figure 4 - Sauvignon Blanc Bulk Gallons Available




Figure 5 - Pinot Grigio Bulk Gallons Available





Figure 6 - Pinot Noir Bulk Gallons Available





- unlikely there will be any new meaningful interest in 2023 lots.
- Supply of California Appellation Pinot Noir remains elevated but has come down as the season has progressed. There are still 675,000 gallons actively for sale, but 320,000 of which are 2023 vintage or older and very unlikely to receive any interest. The limited activity around California Appellation Pinot Noir has been sub-\$1.00 per gallon.

Other Reds

- Supply of other Napa Valley red varieties are not significantly larger than they have been historically at just 220,000 gallons actively for sale, but it is still in significant excess of demand. Recent sales have been \$8.00 to \$18.00 per gallon.
- Sonoma County red wine volumes actively for sale are also not out of a historically normal range at 360,000

- gallons actively for sale. There are roughly 100,000 gallons of 2023 or older wine, but buyers have still been purchasing a few 2023 vintage lots between \$7.00 and \$15.00 per gallon, with the majority on the lower end of this range.
- There are still 410,000 gallons of North Coast and 1.1 million gallons of Central Coast red wines other than Cabernet Sauvignon and Pinot Noir still on the market. Volumes have been coming down over the last several months, but slowly. Demand has been very low with recent sales of smaller-lot Merlot between \$7.00 and \$10.00 per gallon between the two regions.
- Over 3.1 million gallons of California Appellation red wine remain on the market, and 1.8 million gallons of this are 2023 vintage or older, with little demand to absorb the remaining older supply. There have been a few deals done for Zinfandel, Merlot, and Petite Sirah, but it appears as though buyers are already moving on to the 2024 vintage. Recent sales have been between \$0.50 and \$6.00 per gallon.
